

#### Abstract:

#### **Formulating Dioxane-Free Products**

1,4-Dioxane is a contaminant of interest for many global regulators due to its role as a toxicant and possible carcinogen. It can be found in many personal care products as the result of ethoxylation or other select processes which use ethylene oxide as an intermediate. Recent rulemaking in the state of New York will likely require a significant reduction of ethoxylated ingredients and other certain reaction products. Fortunately, the personal care industry had already made significant strides in new product development to replace ingredients with potential dioxane contamination. This presentation will focus on dioxane-free alternatives in three common application areas: mild surfactants, emulsifiers, and thickeners. It will present a variety of alternate technologies and provide efficacy data for selected technologies, including zein scores for irritation, emulsion stability data for emulsifiers, and viscosity response curves for thickening.

#### Bio:

Dennis Abbeduto has over 25 years surfactant and formulation chemistry experience and currently

works for Colonial Chemical, Inc in Southeast Tennessee as Personal Care Business Manager. He has also served as Product Applications Manager at Colonial.

Prior to his time at Colonial Chemical, he worked for Alberto-Culver Co in Chicago, Illinois on skin care technology and as a formulation chemist for the St. Ives and Noxzema brands. Dennis also worked for McIntyre Group, Ltd in University Park, Illinois as an R&D synthesis, applications, and claims chemist. He has a BS in chemistry from Governors State University in University Park, Illinois.



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


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
## **Membership Programs and Privileges**




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## SCC Ontario Chapter Holiday Donation Campaign for the North York Harvest Food Bank

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



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## Thank Heavens for Bio-Available Bio-Identical Human Collagen!

Until not long ago, it was practically impossible to find skin care products specifically designed for women over 45. When women turned 45 they seemed to disappear, they become invisible to the manufacturers and marketers of personal care products. Fortunately, the cosmetics industry has now realized that mature skin has its own unique needs, and that women over 45 are a wealthy market segment (yes, a segment, not niche! In the US 50 percent of female adults are over age 50) worth investing technology and marketing resources. In the last two years, the market has been flooded with skin care products, from large established companies to new indie start-ups, that speak to the perimenopausal and menopausal women, and address their skin care needs.

According to the Mayo Clinic, women officially enter menopause one year after their last period. Menopause happens when the ovaries stop producing as much estrogen, and no longer release an egg each month. The decrease of estrogen levels during perimenopause, which typically starts in the 40s and can last up to 7-10 years, results in reduced levels of Collagen (type I and type III) in the dermis of the skin and scalp.

Studies show that women's skin loses about 30% of its collagen during the first five years of menopause. After that, the decline is more gradual. Women lose about 2% of their collagen ever year for the next 20 years. As collagen diminishes, the skin loses its firmness and begins to sag. Skin pores also enlarge due to lack of skin firmness. These enlarged pores can lead to adult acne. The pH level of the skin also changes, making the skin more sensitive, and women are more likely to develop rashes and easily irritated skin. If they have an existing skin condition, such as eczema or rosacea, this could worsen.

It has been demonstrated, by *in-vitro* and clinical studies, that the use of skin care products containing bio-available bio-identical human collagen results in increased collagen in the dermis and provides significant benefits to skin elasticity, wrinkle reduction and reduction of skin redness.

#### **Clinical Study Results**

14 subjects with Caucasian Fitzpatrick skin type III and an average age of 58, were treated with a serum containing 0.1% active of sh-Polypeptide-121, a bioavailable bio-identical human collagen. The serum was applied to clean skin twice per day, AM and PM, for 8 weeks. There was a week washout before measurements were taken.

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

## **November 4th Meeting Recap**

For our final virtual technical meeting for 2021 we were pleased to host Howard Epstein whose topic was "*New Perspectives on Aging Skin.*"

Howards presentation discussed how the world's population of over 60 years of age is rapidly increasing as it's life expectancy, and for this reason, the cosmetics industry is more and more interested in understanding the biology of aging skin with a goal to fight the appearance of aging skin and ultimately slow down the aging process.

He explained that, as aging is a complex series of events that occur slowly over the course of time both internal and external factors can influence aging skin and that there are variations in the way people age that are associated with genetics, gender, ethnicity and lifestyle.

Mr Epstein's presentation discussed photoaging associated with chronic inflammation, UV, IR and blue lightinduced photoaging, protein oxidation and why the impact of each may result in a difference of aging skin in various skin types. He explained how the understanding the molecular mechanisms associated with the variation of aging including the variation in appearance of aging skin will help in product development of improved personalized skin and hair care products

## ONTARIO CHAPTER SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM SOCIETY FOR COSMETIC CHEMISTS

The support of Cosmetic Science Education and Research are central to the goals of the Society of Cosmetic Chemists (SCC). The Ontario Chapter has developed a Scholarship Program available to students planning to complete

The Ontario Chapter has supported the Seneca College Cosmetic Science Program and students by providing several scholarships. Students of the Seneca School of Biological Science and Applied Chemistry will also be supported with a new award starting in the current school year.

Successful scholarship and award candidates are encouraged to attend SCC meetings, volunteer at events, collaborate with members, prepare a poster presentation, write an article for the newsletter and make an oral presentation on their research at a chapter meeting.
