### Abstract:

Impact of FDA monograph on sunscreen formulations; formulating with inorganic sunscreens


The proposed rules published by the FDA in the Federal Register in February 2019 had the biggest impact on sunscreen formulations since the publication of the first tentative monograph in August 1978. In this presentation, the MUsT (Maximal Usage Trial) study conducted by the FDA that led to the proposed changes will be discussed as well as the impact of those changes on future formulations.

In addition, an in-depth review of formulation strategies with zinc and titanium oxides will be presented. Methodologies used to screen various types of inorganic sunscreens such as zeta potential, contact angle, particle size analysis, SEM microscopy and Hegman gauge will be presented and compared. The effect of particle size on SPF and skin whitening will be discussed. Differences between formulating inorganic sunscreens in O/W and W/O emulsions and their impact on water resistance and formulation stability will be reviewed. The addition of polymers and SPF boosters to increase SPF and water resistance will be presented along with some *in vivo* SPF testing data.

The work presented will enable formulators to get a head-start to adapt their formulations to the guidelines set forth by the FDA and prepare them to formulate efficiently with inorganic sunscreens.

### Biography:

Donald Prettypaul has over twenty-five years of industrial experience, mostly with Ashland where he worked on a variety of disciplines. He started his career in analytical chemistry, then moved to other areas like polymer synthesis, microemulsions, and applied research. Don is currently working in the skincare applications group as a Principal Scientist. Don has a BS in Chemistry from City University of New York, and an MA in Cosmetic Science from Farleigh Dickinson University and Ph.D from Rutgers University.

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


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# **October 6th Education Day Recap**

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

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# Molecular Biology, Gene Expression and the Prospects for Personalized Cosmetics

### INTRODUCTION TO GENE EXPRESSION

Just prior to the initiation of The Human Genome Project (HGP) that began in 1990 (1990-2003), publications in the press predicted that with the sequencing of the human genome, cures for many of the diseases of man would be discovered. The reality is that a large part of the early work was devoted to the development of more efficient techniques to elucidate the genome. The goal of the project was to analyze the structure of human DNA and determine the location of all human genes. DNA from model organisms other than human were studied to provide comparative information to understand the functioning of the human genome. Initially it was too costly to sequence whole human genomes. For this reason, the investigators decided to study sites on the genome where many people have a variant DNA unit. This project called HapMap focused on catalog-ing common variants found in European, Asian and African genomes.

### GENE EXPRESSION AND THE COSMETICS INDUSTRY

Since the condusion of the Human Genome Project, studies of DNA variation have enabled genetic testing that can show a predisposition to a varie-ty of illnesses.

Genetic testing has expanded to the cosmetics industry for evaluation of ingredients that can be optimally paired with consumers based on a gene analysis of the individual.

Currently one typically formulates for the average consumer, the aim of personalized skin care is to match each person with a formulation that will work best for that individual. To formulate personalized products, one needs to consider how variations in our genes influence our skin. Consider genetic variations that contribute to height, hair and skin color. It is known that different skin types respond differently to radiation including UVB UVA and blue light. While not completely understood, biological pathways that are responsible for these variations are constantly being identified.

### **EPIGENETICS**

Factors from the environment, our diets and lifestyle also influence our health and skin and the genes that interact with the se influences need to be considered as well in formulating personalized products. Environment, diet and lifestyle have an influence on each person's epigenetically- controlled gene expression. Many of these genes are identified, knowing how epigenetic gene expression may be modified by alteration of diet, lifestyle and targeted care. Epigenetic changes can help determine whether genes are turned on or off and influence the production of proteins in certain cells. The mechanism of epigenetics ensures that one is DNA is not necessarily their destiny.

### SAFEGUARDING PERSONAL GENETIC INFORMATION

Safeguarding of personal health information is of the upmost concern. The Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act (GINA) enacted in 2008 was intended to protect Americans from discrimination based on their genetic information in both health insuran œ and employment. The Act prohibits health insurers from engaging in genetic discrimination.



# Why Is Diet Coke So Fizzy?

Whether you're buying ingredients for an at home "Coke and Mentos" demonstration, asking a flight attendant for a beverage, or just trying to pour a can of soda into a glass before hockey comes back on, you may have noticed something: Diet

sugar-free sodas fizz more than regular sugar-rich sodas when opened.

The degree of carbonation or "fizziness" of a soda is partly a function of how easily carbon dioxide bubbles can form in the sugary flavour water we call pop. When it's easier for bubbles to form, you get more of them and therefore an increased "fizziness".

When a liquid has a high surface tension, it means that the bonds between the liquid's molecules are very strong. Surface tension is why some spiders can walk on water—the spider's weight isn't enough to break apart the water molecules! In a substance with high surface tension, bubbles will not form very easily.

Surfactants are chemicals that decrease the surface tension of a liquid. They will therefore make it a bit easier for bubbles to form. Regarding Diet Coke, aspartame, and potassium benzoate (a preservative) are surfactants! Caffeine as well, but it has much less of an effect due to its low concentration

Bubbles of gas will struggle to form in very viscous liquids, like maple syrup or waffle batter. Diet soda actually has a slightly higher viscosity than sugary soda, which slightly diminishes its fizzing potential. However, a slightly higher viscosity means that when bubbles do form, they're a bit more stable. This <a href="mailto:explains">explains</a> why Diet Coke not only fizzes more than dassic Coke, but the foam also lasts longer!

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
